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Illuminated the craftsmanship of screenwriting This book explains the foundations of screenwriting including the structure of a film, the structure of a script, and strategies for writing a screenplay. Strategies consist of "all character is revealed through actions" (not internal dialog) and "all drama comes from conflict. Field can help you shortcut that and work out how to do it right. It provided me a much higher appreciation for screenwriting as an art form and demonstrated me how different it is from other styles of writing. The knowledge I gained from Screenplay heightened my enjoyment of watching these movies because I now have a better appreciation for the workmanship that went in to the creation. So when you get down to the specifics, there is not quite definitely meat. This not only contributed to my understanding, but turned me on to some very nice films I had not yet seen. It's just way too verbose and doesn't in fact deliver information and suggestions in ways that's useful. It isn't the -only- text on the subject, or the -only- one you should examine, but it should be the -1st- one you examine. The chapters absence focus, for one thing. Discussions about personality, plot factors, theme, context, etc. are presented in an extremely jumbled up way. He says, for example, that plot points move the story ahead, without specifying (at least in the parts I browse) what "moving the tale forward" in fact means. It's a little bit like baking a cake: you will be more creative when you understand the ground guidelines, and that's what most of us wish: delicious cakes and exciting movies. He could have referred to examples in a more concise method, leaving it to readers to view the films that interest them. So many complications in scripts is the result of poor structure.
