A fantasy? The family was forced to become animated characters, communicating with him in Disney dialogue and song; An autistic boy who couldn't speak for years, Owen memorized a large number of Disney films, turned them right into a language expressing love and loss, kinship, brotherhood. This is actually the real-life story of Owen Suskind, the child of the Pulitzer Prize-earning journalist Ron Suskind and his wife, Cornelia. A nightmare? until each of them emerge, jointly, revealing how, in darkness, we all literally need stories to survive.

He even shows that this form of therapy would result in enormous cost savings for treatment of autism.
