Derrida sought to find the meaning (or lack thereof) behind an umbrella described in Nietzsche's notes, Robert Louis Stevenson wrote essays on the handy object, and Dickens used umbrellas as a narrative device for just about everything. As Rankine highlights, many others have tried. She tackles the gender, course, and public connotations of having an umbrella and helps us understand our deep connection to this most forgettable everyday object--which we only think of when we don't have one.
